1 The Clock Tower

Yefet St 14, Tel Aviv-Yafo, Israel

Clock Square is one of the two main squares in Jaffa and serves as the gateway to the Old City. The square is part of the development process that Jaffa underwent towards the end of the 19th century and the beginning of the twentieth century, while the city began to expand beyond the walls that surrounded it. The name of the square was given to it following the clock tower placed in its center, which was built by the Ottomans in the early 20th century to celebrate the 25th year of the reign of Sultan Abdul Hamid II. During this period when the clock tower was built, the square was lined with government buildings (such as the Turkish government house, the Saraya), shops, a market and a mosque. It was a main transportation artery used to connect Jaffa with other cities and first and foremost with Jerusalem. Although today the square is not used as a transportation artery, it is still full of life and shops and is a must-see site on any trip to Jaffa.

2 HaPisga Garden

Tel Aviv-Yafo, Israel

The summit garden (or also Abrasha), as its name implies, is a garden located on the top of Givat Jaffa. This is a beautiful garden that not only provides a spectacular view of Jaffa, the sea and Tel Aviv but is also a pleasant contrast to the structural density that characterizes the architecture in Jaffa.

The garden also includes the Wishing Bridge, archeological finds such as the Ramesses Gate and an impressive and majestic statue of the sculptor Daniel Kafri. The statue, placed at the highest point in the garden, is called the "Gate of Faith" and depicts the dream of Jacob, the binding of Isaac and the conquest of Jericho.

3 The path of the zodiac

Jaffa is a captivating city, shaped over thousands of years. As such it has a distinctive architecture of low-rise buildings, dense construction and narrow alleys. Those narrow alleys of Old Jaffa are a major attraction of the city and are an excellent starting point for its recognition. A stroll through these alleys will reveal much of the hidden beauty of Jaffa, there is a lot of magic in the alleys on the names of the zodiac, in search of your zodiac sign, in the various buildings that include many galleries and of course a wonderful view of the deep blue Mediterranean. The alleys are the place to get a little lost, soak up the special atmosphere of Jaffa and discover more from the city whose history goes back to the days of the Bible.



4 Al Bahr Mosque

Tel Aviv-Yafo, Israel

Small in size but with a minaret (turret) visible from a distance, the Sea Mosque (Al-Bahra Mosque) is an integral part of the wonderful view from the promenade. Facing the sea, this mosque was the place where Muslim sailors delivered their prayers before leaving the mainland. It is difficult to determine the date of the construction of the Sea Mosque, but evidence shows that these are centuries in which the mosque was an integral part of the life of the Muslim residents of the city.



5 Andromeda Rock

Andromeda Rock

If you look from the second ascent street to the Mediterranean, you can see Andromeda rock, an ancient rock that is the subject of a legend from Greek mythology about the wrath of the gods, human arrogance, sacrifice and love. Andromeda, the home of the Ethiopian king and queen, Cepheus and Cassiopeia, was a victim of arrogance. When Cassiopeia boasted that her house was more beautiful than Poseidon's, he sent a monster to the sea to the shores of Jaffa. To save the inhabitants, Andromeda, naked as on the day of her birth, was chained to a rock to serve as a victim to the monster. She was eventually saved thanks to Zeus' son, Perseus, who later married her.

To facilitate the identification of Andromeda rock, it is marked with the Israeli flag.

6 Jaffa Port

Jaffa is recognized as one of the oldest port cities in the world. The port, which operates almost continuously from the Bronze Age and is even mentioned in the Bible, is an extraordinary and valuable historical piece. Galleries and music, art and cultural events. Along with the magnificent view of the Mediterranean Sea and the shoreline of Tel Aviv, Jaffa Port is one of the most photogenic places in Israel.
